**Dates:** August 11-16, 2024, as well as pre class Zoom meeting.

**Times:** 9 am-11 pm

**Format:** : In person with online Zoom meetings of 3 hours for pre camp preparation and post camp evaluation/discussion. Jazz in the Mountains offers the opportunity for a unique musical experience, situated in a beautiful Vermont setting, that brings together adult instrumentalists, music educators, and professional jazz musicians/artists for a week of exploration, rehearsals, performances, and growth – in a healthy atmosphere of shared interests, musicianship, and supportive instruction.

**Fees include breakfasts and dinners, tuition, and amenities for the camp duration. Lunches, private lessons, and incidentals are not included.**

**Course Description:** Jazz in the Mountains brings 9 highly respected jazz performer/educators to Killington in a 5-day program offering an

immersion experience in jazz performance and teaching. Students will participate in and observe ensemble rehearsals, music theory/performance clinics, jam sessions, musicianship training classes, and faculty and student performances.

**Audience:** K-12 Music Teachers and adults interested in developing their jazz performance and teaching skills.

**Course Goals:** Students will enhance their skills in jazz performance, improvisation, and their knowledge of jazz styles and history as well as developing strategies for sharing this knowledge with colleagues and students.

**Course Objectives:** Students will be able to introduce their students to study and practice techniques used by jazz masters to develop their improvisations and interpretation and development of various jazz styles including swing, Latin, bebop, and ballads. Students will receive instruction from teacher/artists who are and have been instructors at institutions including the Navy School of Music, University of Vermont, Johnson State College, Castleton University, Middlebury College, Middlebury Community Music Center, University of Connecticut, the Maynard Ferguson Jazz Institute, and Rowan University. Students will keep a journal of sessions attended and associated teaching/learning strategies.

**Course Schedule:** Students will attend 90 minutes of pre and post class Zoom sessions. Sample schedule available at <https://www.jazzinthemountains.com/resources2022.html>.

**Instructor Biography:** Course instructor Glendon Ingalls is a multi-instrumentalist who maintains an active performance schedule playing trumpets, double bass, electric bass, and sousaphone. He has performed and/or directed at festivals and delivered teaching clinics in a dozen states and four countries. Current teaching appointments are for Trumpet and Jazz Camp Director at Middlebury Community Music Center, Trumpet and Bass at Middlebury College, and Trumpet and Bass at Castleton University. He is also Camp Director for the Middlebury Community Music Center Jazz Camp for youth.

**Other Suggested Readings/Texts:** Materials for individual ensembles and clinics will be distributed before camp online and during in person sessions the week of jazz camp.

**Assignments:** Students will keep a journal of pre camp meetings as well as rehearsals and clinics attended at Jazz in the Mountains. The journal will detail times met and subjects and activities addressed. There will be a post camp online Zoom at which the student will deliver a report on learning outcomes.

Students taking this class at the Graduate level will be asked to detail how they will implement delivery of learning they obtained in attending this class.

**Projects:** Students will attend and/or perform at a culminating concert demonstrating mastery of learning concepts presented.

**Evaluation:** Based on attendance and participation in all rehearsals and clinics, and submission of a chronical (journal) of learning.

**Grading:** Based on successful completion and submission of above noted tasks.

**Expectation:** Students enrolled in this course will complete a series of activities, readings, and reflections before, during and/or after any scheduled face-to-face or synchronous sessions. This will assure that Carnegie expectations for a credited course, both new learning and hours of outside preparation, are sufficiently met.

These course requirements can be met through a combination of Academic Engagement and Academic Preparation.

### **Course Drop & Withdrawal Policies**

Vermont State University (VTSU) Center for Schools offers courses to educators with the expectation that registrants will complete the course. However, the university realizes circumstances arise in one's personal life that may cause disruptions. Please review the course drop and withdrawal policies detailed below very carefully.

#### **Drop Policy**

For a course that is **8 weeks or less** in duration, a student can **drop** the course **within the first 7 days** for any reason. For a course that is **more than 8 weeks** in duration, a student can drop the course **within the first 14 days** for any reason. The course **will NOT appear on a transcript** and the student (or school/district) can expect a full refund for any tuition paid.

The student must email a drop notification to the instructor *and* submit a Center for Schools drop request form at this [link](#).

Once the applicable drop period detailed above has passed, drop requests will no longer be honored.

### **Withdrawal Policy**

After the initial drop period has passed, but **before 60%** of the course has taken place, a student can **withdraw** from a course. The course **will appear on the student transcript with a "W"** in the grading column and NO refund can be issued. The student must email a **withdrawal** request to the instructor and complete the withdrawal request form at this [link](#). Again, this form must be submitted before 60% of the course has taken place.

After 60% of the course has been completed, withdrawals are NO longer permitted. At this point, a student has 3 options:

1. Complete the course as originally planned.
2. Request a formal extension from the instructor and the university, which, if granted, would allow up to an additional 7 weeks to complete the coursework.
3. Accept a final grade based on the work completed to date, even if it means a failing grade.
